I am a Provider

Call our emergency number (888-825-7174) to:

- * Report damage to your facility
- st Report closure due to the emergency/disaster
- * Request expanded capacity to care for children dis- * placed by the disaster

I am a Parent

- * Call SC Child Care Resource and Referral at 888-335-1002 if you need assistance finding alternative child care during an emergency.
- * If you sustained losses or damage from the flooding, call 800-624-3362 to see if you qualify for aid.

##SCAM ALERT##

FEMA Inspectors are working in areas impacted by flooding to assist with the recovery process. State and federal workers never ask for or accept money, and always carry identification badges with a photograph. There is no fee required to apply for or to get disaster assistance from FEMA, the U.S. Small Business Administration (SBA) or the state. Additionally, no state or federal government disaster assistance agency will call to ask for your financial account information; unless you place a call to the agency yourself, you should not provide personal information over the phone – it can lead to identity theft.

National Guard is assisting local law enforcement in some areas, such as Richland County. They will be in uniform and must also show their ID when requested. They have been given temporary authority to detain or arrest. Unfortunately, there have been some reports of looting so law enforcement needs a larger presence.

Boil Water Advisory—Restrictions and Tips:

Your water might be clear, but don't drink it.

- Boil water for one full minute before being used for cooking or drinking
- Don't use appliances that might require drinkable water (dishwashers, ice machines, drinking fountains)
- Dispose of ice that may have been made during the boil water advisory
- Turn on taps to flush out water lines
- Water is safe to use for showering, shaving, and other cleaning purposes
- Don't swallow water used to brush teeth unless that water has been boiled
