I. STUDY BACKGROUND

A. PURPOSE OF CHILD CARE MARKET RATE SURVEY

The Federal Child Care and Development Block Grant (CCDBG) Act of 2014 at 42 U.S.C.9858c(c)(4)(B) and the Child Care and Development Fund (CCDF) final rule at 45 CFR 98.45 requires states and territories to develop and conduct either a market rate survey or alternative methodology to guide them in determining the amounts they will pay for child care subsidies. The CCDBG Act requires the market rate survey or alternative methodology to be conducted every 3 years. The National Center on Subsidy Innovation and Accountability with the Early Childhood Training and Technical Assistance System of the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services, Administration on Children and Families, Office of Child Care, prepared a series of briefs addressing topics related to market rate surveys. In these briefs, the purpose of child care market rate surveys is described as follows:

A market rate survey is the collection and analysis of prices and fees charged by child care providers for services in the priced market. The priced market is the open market where parent and provider do not have a relationship that could affect the price charged. The purpose of the market rate survey is to guide Lead Agencies in setting subsidy payments within the context of market conditions so that they are sufficient to provide families receiving subsidies with equal access to the full range of child care services that private-paying families have. The CCDF Final Rule of 2016 requires Lead Agencies administering CCDF to conduct either a statistically valid and reliable market rate survey or an alternative methodology approved in advance by the ACF Office of Child Care. The CCDF regulations require Lead Agencies to ensure that market rate surveys reflect the full population of providers in various geographic location, category of provider, and age of child. To meet this requirement, Lead Agencies are recommended to examine all relevant providers or a statistically valid sample of providers for all localities in their jurisdiction. The child care market includes all providers that offer child care services to the public statewide and within local service areas for an established price. The market is defined as the entire population of child care providers that determine the price of child care services. Unregulated and license-exempt providers, particularly providers who are relatives or friends of the child's family, are generally not considered part of the priced child care market and should not be included in a

market rate survey. (National Center on Subsidy Innovation and Accountability briefs on Market Rate Surveys 2018 through 2020 at https://childcareta.acf.hhs.gov/centers/national-center-child-care-subsidy-innovation-and-accountability).

South Carolina's 2020 Child Care Market Rate Survey was conducted by the Center for Urban Affairs and Community Services (CUACS) at North Carolina State University for the South Carolina Department of Social Services (SCDSS) Division of Early Care and Education (DECE), the Lead Agency administering the Child Care and Development Fund (CCDF) in South Carolina. This study is based on a survey of South Carolina's regulated child care providers, along with the license-exempt child care providers that are enrolled with the SC Voucher Program. This report describes the procedures used in the survey and provides background on the current operation of child care facilities in South Carolina.

B. REQUIREMENTS FOR SUBSIDIZED CHILD CARE

The objective in market rate surveys is to determine what child care providers are charging the general population so that child care subsidy payments can be set at a level that allows families with subsidies to have equal access to the full range of child care that is available to families not receiving subsidies. Lead Agencies must describe in their CCDF State Plan the facts they relied on to determine that subsidy payments are sufficient to ensure equal access. Lead Agencies consider a number of factors in determining subsidy payments. The benchmark for equal access established by the Administration for Children and Families (ACF) Office of Child Care (OCC) is the 75th percentile of rates in the current child care market, based on the most recent child care market rate survey conducted no earlier than two years before submission of the CCDF State Plan. As described by the Office of Child Care's National Center on Subsidy Innovation and Accountability,

"A percentile is the value at or below which a given percentage of observations in a group of observations fall. It is a ranking of the market prices, rather than an average of the reported charges. To calculate market rate percentiles, a researcher lists the prices in rank order, from highest to lowest, alongside the number of providers that reported charging the same price. The 75th percentile market rate is the price at or below which 75 percent of child care

providers reported charging for services." (National Center on Subsidy Innovation and Accountability briefs on Market Rate Surveys 2018 through 2020:

II. STUDY METHODOLOGY

A. SURVEY POPULATION

All regulated child care centers, group child care homes, and family child care homes, along with ABC Quality-enrolled license-exempt child care centers were included in the market rate survey population. The stated private pay rates charged by the facilities were used in the calculation of the market rates.

B. SURVEY DESIGN

Prior to the market rate survey design, SCDSS convened a virtual meeting of 38 child care stakeholders to obtain their perspectives and recommendations for the market rate survey and process. Participants included representatives from the Early Childhood Advisory Council, all types of child care providers to be surveyed (centers, group and family child care homes, providers serving children experiencing homelessness, faith-based, and afterschool providers), early care and education services agencies (SC First Steps to School Readiness and County First Steps partnership), professional organizations (SC Association for the Education of Young Children, SC Early Childhood Association, SC Association of Early Childhood Education, SC Association of Community Action Partnerships), university contractors that provide technical assistance to child care providers (University of South Carolina: SC Child Care Resource and Referral Network, Inclusion Collaborative, Program for Infant-Toddler Care), and South Carolina's market rate survey contractor North Carolina State University's Center for Urban Affairs and Community Services. A proposed methodology and survey questions were discussed along with the impact that the COVID-19 pandemic has been having on child care providers and the families they serve. Specific issues addressed were types and frequency of fees that providers charge (such as registration, re-enrollment, activity fees, etc.) in addition to their rates for child care services/tuition and whether those are assessed per child or family if more than one child in child care. There was discussion about whether providers charge families if there is a difference between the rates they charge and the subsidy payment and copayment. A provider explained that it is a balancing act of what they charge and when because they are not going to let the difference between the SC Voucher (subsidy) payment and the rates they charge cost them the enrollment. There was discussion about temporary closures of child care programs due to positive COVID cases but with plans to reopen. A provider said that they were not mixing children so when there is a positive COVID -19 case, they are only closing the classroom. After

the virtual meeting, SCDSS staff met virtually with the NC State University CUACS contractor team to finalize the market rate survey and process based on stakeholders' input.

The study involved the use of a single survey form for child care centers, group child care homes, and family child care homes. The 2020 survey was designed to capture information on child care enrollment and rates for the month of September 2020. A pretest of the survey and instructions was conducted and, based on respondent input during the pretest, minor changes were made to the final survey form and instructions.

C. DATA COLLECTION AND DATA QUALITY CONTROL PROCEDURES

Three methods were used to complete the market rate survey: mail, online, or by telephone. A Market Rate Survey packet was mailed to 2,121 child care centers, group child care homes, and family child care homes in South Carolina in September 2020. The survey packet included a letter from the Director of Division of Early Care and Education (DECE) asking child care providers to complete an online survey at a secure site hosted by CUACS (see *Appendix A*). The secure website allowed respondents to download a PDF of the survey if they preferred to complete the survey on paper and return by mail (*Appendix B*). The survey packet also included instructions for completing the survey, and a postcard that could be returned if respondents believed they were ineligible to participate in the survey or to schedule an appointment.

Three weeks after the initial survey packet was mailed, trained interviewers made telephone calls to nonresponding child care providers in an attempt to complete the survey. These telephone calls were conducted over a period of ten weeks. Using an established protocol, telephone interviewers reminded survey non-respondents of the importance of the survey and assured confidentiality of their information. Providers who chose not to complete the survey via internet or telephone were given the option of using mail or fax to return the survey form. Based on outcomes of the telephone calls, survey packets were mailed or faxed to respondents who had not completed the survey online, who had lost or discarded the survey packet, or who reported not receiving a survey packet.

D. FINAL SAMPLE

1. Sample Disposition and Response Rate

Contacts were attempted with a total of 2,121 facilities including 1,377 Child Care Centers, 75 Group Child Care Homes, and 669 Family Child Care Homes (Table 1).

Table 2 contains information on the final response rate for the "adjusted sample." The adjusted sample *excludes* the categories denoted by an asterisk in Table 1, including: respondents who could not be located, those who represented duplicate records, and those with no children enrolled at the time of the survey. The remaining pool represents respondents included in calculating the response rate (1,864 facilities). Of the 1,864 eligible respondents, 1,666 completed the survey by phone, paper, or online, representing a response rate of 89.4 percent. The response rate for child care centers (91.4%) was higher than for family (84.4%) and group child care homes (90.5%).

2. Sample Characteristics

Tables 3 and 4 show descriptive information on the characteristics of the final survey sample. Table 3 presents information on the number of child care facilities based on their type, quality level rating, and their geographic location (urban or rural). As shown, the majority of facilities are in urban areas and are classified as child care centers.

Table 4 presents information on the number of children enrolled in facilities by payment type and geographic location (urban or rural). A total of 77,750 children are represented among the facilities participating in the survey. Among these children, 64,620 are full-time and 13,130 are part-time. Of the facilities, 12.3% of them have children enrolled in the South Carolina Voucher Program.

The 2020 survey included questions regarding factors that impact day-to-day facility operation and rates. Providers were asked to identify the method(s) they used to set private pay rates, if their facility received monetary or nonmonetary contributions, and if the current economy affects their ability to provide services.

III. CHILD CARE PROGRAM OPERATION

A. BASIS FOR SETTING PRIVATE PAY RATES

Facilities generally use more than one source of information to set their child care rates. Table 5 presents information on the various factors used in setting rates. Among 1,666 facilities responding to this question, the most commonly cited factor for child care centers was neighboring program rates (71.2% statewide), while the most important factor for group child care homes and family child care homes was what they felt/heard parents could afford (75.4% and 65.2%, respectively). Child care centers responded that they set their rates based on what they felt/heard parents could afford as the second most considered piece of information used to set their private pay rate (55.6%). Group child care homes had the actual cost of providing child care as the second most important factor (49.1%), while family child care homes cited neighboring program rates as the second most important factor (53.7%).

B. CONTRIBUTIONS TO ASSIST WITH PROGRAM OPERATION

Table 6 shows contributions to assist with child care facility operations. Among the total sample (n=1,666), the most common contribution was grants, such as the CARES Act. Across all three facility types, 77.2% of child care centers, 91.2% of group child care homes, and 79.7% of family child care homes responded that they had received grants. Child care centers and family child care homes cited receiving materials and supplies as the second most common type of contribution (40.2% and 40.7%, respectively), while group child care homes cited receiving Child & Adult Care Food Program (CACFP) support (87.7%).

C. IMPACT OF ECONOMIC CONDITIONS ON CHILD CARE SERVICES

Child care facility respondents were asked if current economic conditions contributed to an increase, decrease, or no change in their ability to provide particular services within the last twelve months. Findings indicate how current economic conditions impact providers' child care services (Table 7). Almost half of group child care homes and family child care homes increased their food budget. Around 37% of child care centers experienced an increase in the cost of equipment, materials, and services, with food budget seeing the second most increased costs. Child care centers were more likely to indicate that there had been no changes in the ability to provide quality care because of economic conditions. Facilities were also asked if their number of classrooms increased, decreased, or had no change (Table 8). Child care centers were more likely to indicate that there was either a decrease or no change in their classroom sizes. Table 9 provides information on changes that were made in staff benefits or bonuses. A majority of the facilities indicated that staff benefits and staff bonuses were not offered. Where they were offered, most respondents indicated that there had been no change.

D. FACILITIES PROVIDING CHILD CARE DURING NONTRADITIONAL HOURS AND FEES CHARGED FOR VARIOUS SERVICES

Table 10 provides information on facilities that provide child care for children during nontraditional hours. Over a quarter of ABC Quality Level B+, B, and C nonregulated urban facilities provided care for children during nontraditional hours. A large majority of the facilities represented did not provide care for children during nontraditional hours. Child care centers in urban areas were more likely to provide care during nontraditional hours, while rural family child care homes were likely to provide care during nontraditional hours.

Child care providers were asked a series of questions related to various fees that they may charge. Table 11 shows the percentage of facilities that charged a registration fee by facility type. The majority of facilities that responded to the survey charged a registration fee, with 1,062 of 1,155 child care centers, 39 of 57 group child care homes, and 212 of 454 family child care homes charging a registration fee.

Facilities were asked if they charged a re-enrollment fee, and whether they charged annually or after a child had a temporary break. Child care centers were more likely to charge a re-enrollment fee than group child care homes or family child care homes. Child care centers that were regulated were also more likely to charge a re-enrollment fee. The majority of facilities that responded did not charge a fee after a break (Table 13).

E. FACILITIES CHARGING THE DIFFERENCE BETWEEN SOUTH CAROLINA VOUCHER PAYMENTS AND PRIVATE RATES

Facilities were asked if they charged South Carolina Voucher recipients the difference between their voucher payment and their private pay rates. If respondents answered "yes" to charging the difference, they were asked to state what the difference is that is charged for both full-time and part-time child care. The results are provided for facility type and quality level in Appendix C.

F. REASONS FOR NOT PARTICIPATING IN THE SOUTH CAROLINA VOUCHER PROGRAM

Facilities were asked the specific reasons they did not participate in the SC Voucher program. In Table 17, child care centers and family child care homes were more likely to indicate that not many families qualify for SC Vouchers. Group child care homes were more likely to indicate that they could not handle the administrative requirements. Close to a quarter of family child care homes also indicated that they could not handle the administrative requirements.

IV. DETERMINING CHILD CARE MARKET RATES

A. CHILD CARE MARKET RATES IN THE FEDERALLY -MANDATED SURVEY

This section documents procedures, findings and analyses of child care market rates in the 2020 survey. The 2020 rates are based on data gathered using the 2020 Market Rate Survey. The resulting market rate tables are provided in Appendix D.

B. DETERMINING CHILD CARE MARKET RATES

For the 2020 analysis, the number of children in each age group receiving services from three (3) types of child care providers (child care centers, group child care homes, and family child care homes) in two geographic locations (urban and rural) is calculated as the sum of the number of private paying families and the number of children receiving a SC Voucher subsidy. Children receiving SC Vouchers in a facility are counted at the facility's private pay rate, because that is the rate charged by the facility for child care. Each geographic location's market rate is determined by rank-ordering the private pay rates for all the children reported, from lowest to highest, for each combination of provider type, geographic location, age of child, and part-time or full-time enrollment type.

In such a rank ordering, 25 percent of children will be higher up the scale and 75 percent will be lower on the scale; this point is known statistically as the "75th percentile." This figure represents the raw market rate for each combination of provider type, geographic location, age of child, and part-time vs. full-time enrollment.

Market rates are provided as weekly rates. While the survey asked for weekly rates to be provided, some of the facilities provided rates based on monthly amounts. In the cases where a monthly rate was provided, the weekly rate was calculated by dividing the monthly rate by 4.333. The data was analyzed by weighting the facilities. The weights were applied according to the number of children in each age group in the facility. This weighting was used in order to provide greater weight to facilities that provide care for larger numbers of children in a particular age group.
